This printable activity book introduces five learning scenes inspired by Ainu landscapes, homes, rivers, forests, crafts, and everyday life in northern Japan.

Each illustration is inspired by environments, homes, crafts, animals, boats, clothing, and everyday life connected with the Ainu-inspired themes featured in this volume.

These pages are designed as respectful starting points for learning. They are not intended to represent every member of a community, reproduce sacred or culturally restricted imagery, or provide a complete description of any culture.

Cultures are living, diverse, and constantly changing. People may live in rural areas, towns, or cities and may combine traditional knowledge with modern education, technology, work, and creative expression.

As you color each page, take time to read the short introduction and explore the related Linglobe article. Every language, landscape, and cultural tradition has a deeper story.

How to Use This Book

- Print the pages on A4 paper.
- Use colored pencils, crayons, pens, or markers.
- Read the short cultural introduction on each page.
- Visit Linglobe to learn more about the people and language.
- Use the activity at home, in a classroom, or as part of independent study.

A Note for Families and Educators

We encourage adults and learners to discuss the difference between cultural inspiration and complete cultural representation.

A single illustration cannot explain an entire people or tradition. Use each page as an invitation to ask questions, discover new words, and explore reliable information about the living communities behind the image.

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Ainu-inspired Winter Scene



The Ainu are an Indigenous people of northern Japan, especially Hokkaido. Ainu culture includes its own language, oral traditions, embroidery, wood carving, and knowledge connected with forests, rivers, animals, and the changing seasons.

Look for:

a winter landscape, a wooden home, forest elements, northern plants, and craft-inspired details.

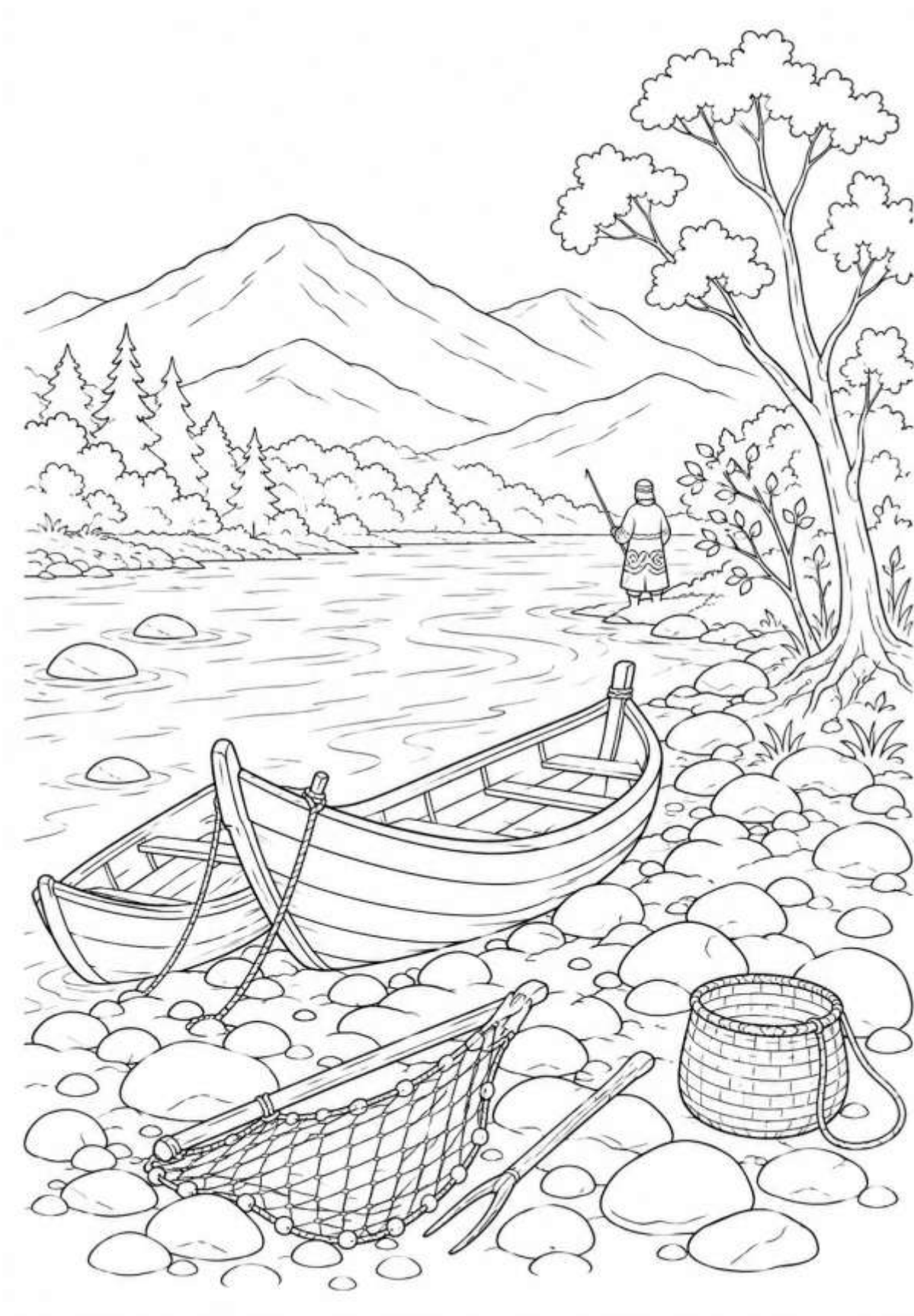
Think About It:

Ainu-inspired River and Fishing Scene



The Ainu have long lived in close relationship with rivers, lakes, and the sea. Fishing was an important part of daily life, and waterways also supported travel, food gathering, and knowledge of the natural environment.

Look for:

a river, a wooden boat, fishing tools, stones, trees, and mountain scenery.

Think About It:

Why might rivers be important for food, movement, and everyday life?

Ainu-inspired Forest Gathering Scene



Forests have long supported many aspects of Ainu life. Knowledge of plants, trees, bark, roots, and other natural materials could be connected with food, crafts, tools, and seasonal activities. Such knowledge was learned through observation and passed between generations.

Look for:

forest trees, useful plants, a woven basket, a woodland path, and a small stream.

Think About It:

How can people learn about plants and natural materials through careful observation?

Ainu culture is known for skilled craft traditions, including textiles, wood carving, embroidery, and the making of useful everyday objects. Handmade work can preserve both practical knowledge and cultural identity.

Look for:

cloth, baskets, craft tools, fiber materials, and a simple working space.

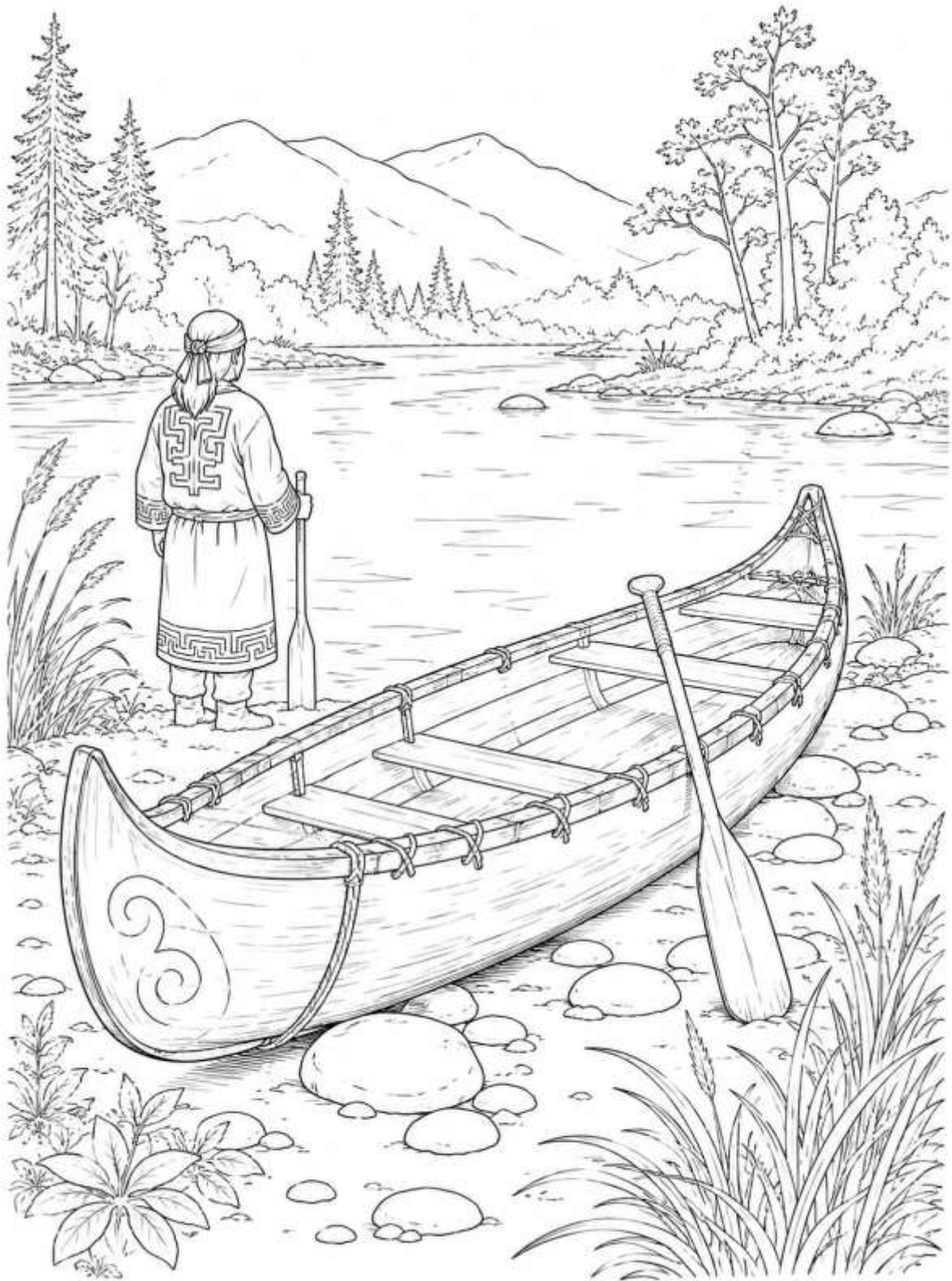
Think About It:
