Welcome to **World Culture Coloring Pages Vol.3: Māori Edition**.

This printable activity book introduces five learning scenes inspired by Māori waka, coastal life, fishing, weaving, paddling, homes, and natural environments in Aotearoa New Zealand.

Each illustration is inspired by the sea, shorelines, plants, tools, handmade objects, and everyday life connected with the Māori-inspired themes featured in this volume.

These pages are designed as respectful starting points for learning. They are not intended to represent every Māori person or community, reproduce sacred or culturally restricted imagery, or provide a complete description of Māori culture.

Māori communities are diverse, living, and constantly changing. Māori people may live in rural areas, towns, or cities and may combine traditional knowledge with modern education, technology, work, art, media, and creative expression.

As you color each page, take time to read the short introduction and explore the related Linglobe article. Every language, landscape, and cultural tradition has a deeper story.

How to Use This Book

- Print the pages on A4 paper.
- Use colored pencils, crayons, pens, or markers.
- Read the short cultural introduction on each page.
- Visit Linglobe to learn more about the people and language.
- Use the activity at home, in a classroom, or as part of independent study.

A Note for Families and Educators

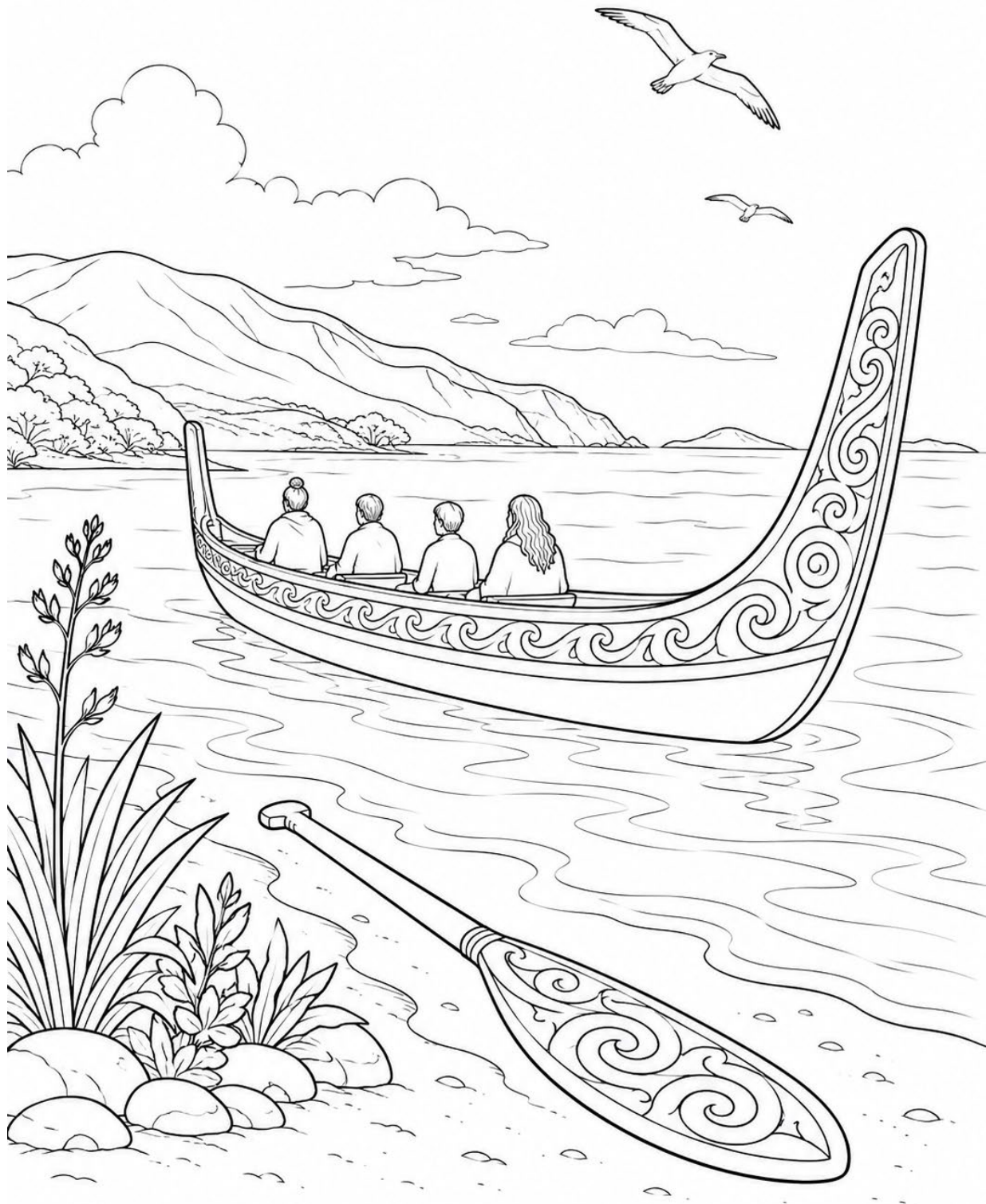
We encourage adults and learners to discuss the difference between cultural inspiration and complete cultural representation.

Māori-inspired Waka and Ocean Scene



Māori are the Indigenous people of Aotearoa New Zealand. Their ancestors traveled across the Pacific using deep knowledge of stars, winds, waves, ocean currents, birds, and seasonal signs.

Waka are important in Māori history and culture as vessels of travel, connection, and community. This scene is inspired by coastal landscapes, waka, paddles, and relationships with the sea.

Look for:

a waka, a paddle, calm water, shoreline plants, rocks, seabirds, distant hills, and people sitting in the canoe.

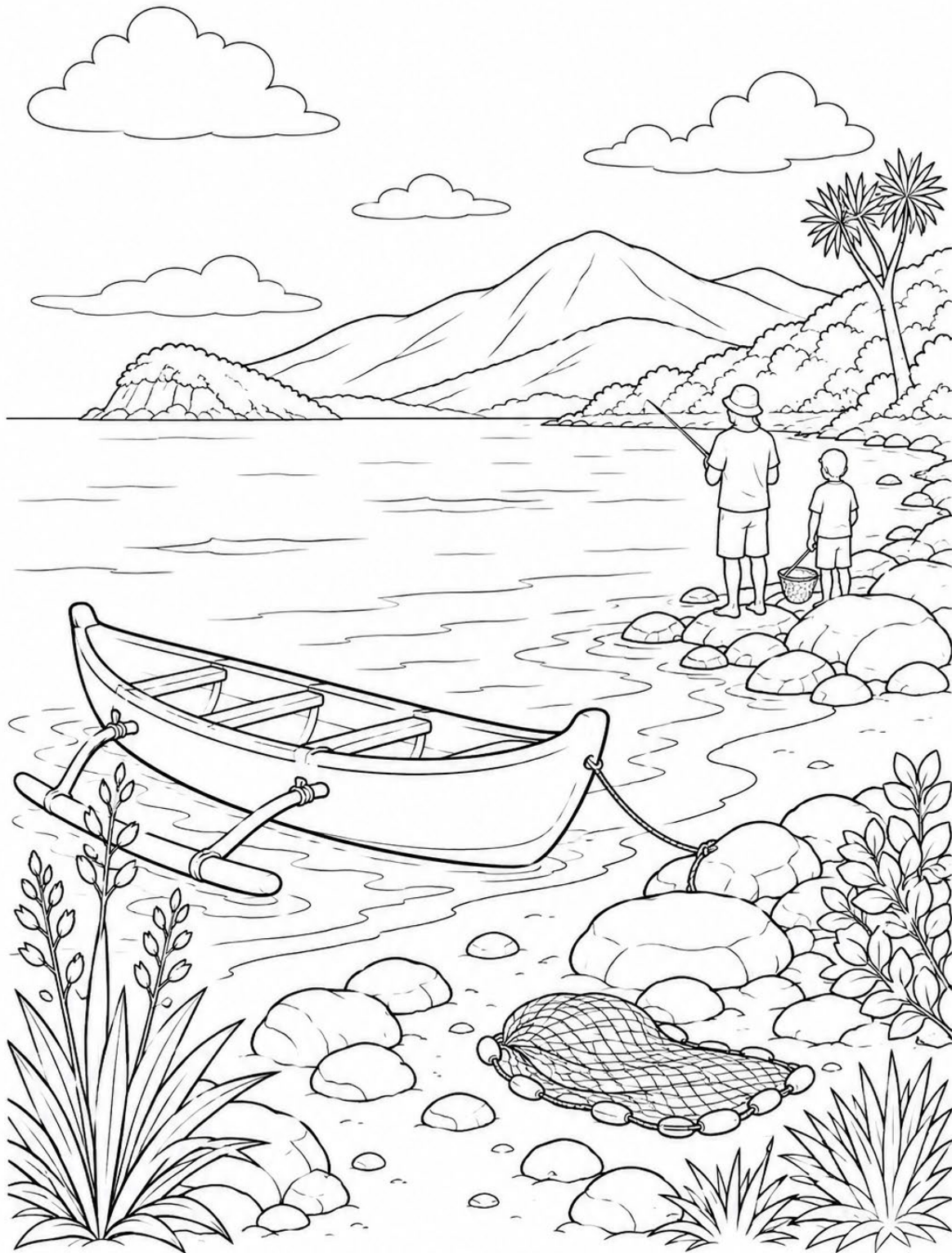
Think About It:

What kinds of knowledge would people need to travel safely across long distances on the ocean?

Māori-inspired Coastal Fishing Scene



The sea has long been important in many Māori communities. Coastal waters provided food, travel routes, and environmental knowledge connected with daily life.

Look for:

a fishing area, a small boat or canoe, gentle waves, rocks, coastal plants, and distant hills.

Think About It:

How can the ocean shape the food, travel, and everyday life of a coastal community?

Māori-inspired Harakeke Weaving and Craft Scene



Harakeke, often called New Zealand flax, has been an important material in Māori life. It has been used for weaving and for making useful everyday objects through skilled craft traditions.

Look for:

harakeke leaves, a woven basket or mat, craft tools, and a simple working area.

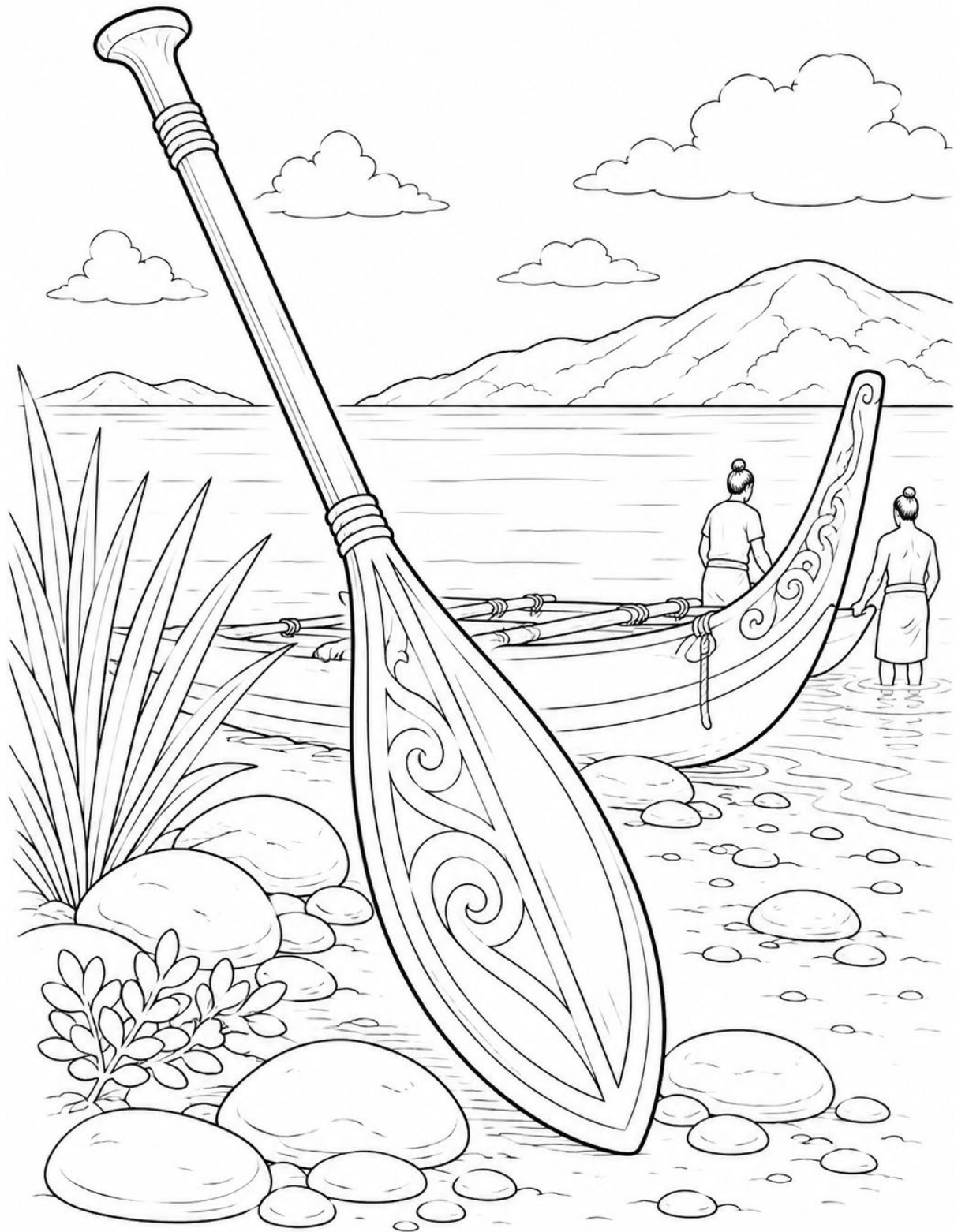
Think About It:

Paddles and waka are connected with movement, teamwork, and practical knowledge of coastal environments. Preparing for travel also requires attention to the sea, weather, and equipment.

Look for:

a paddle, a waka, shoreline plants, stones, gentle water, and distant hills.

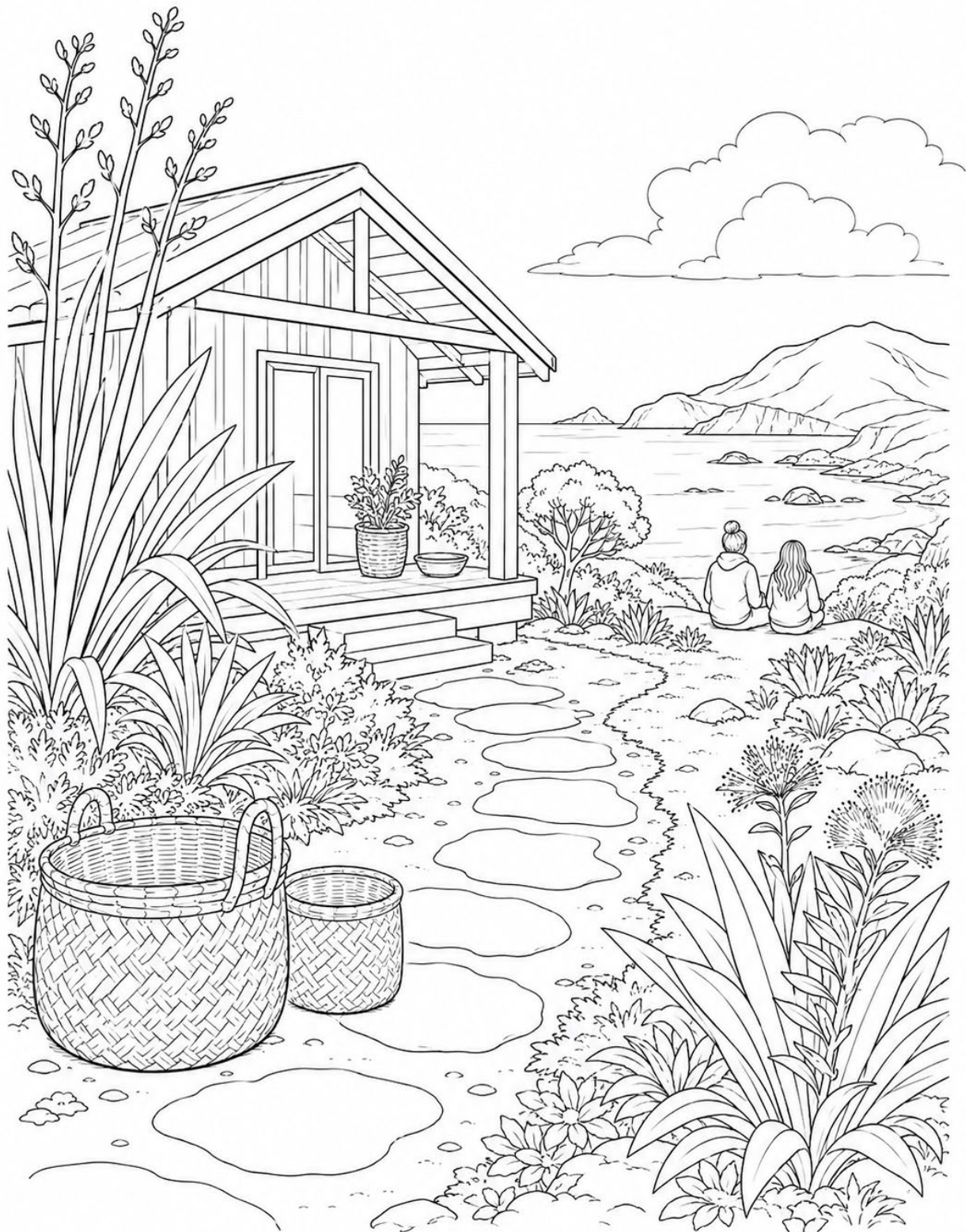
Think About It:
