

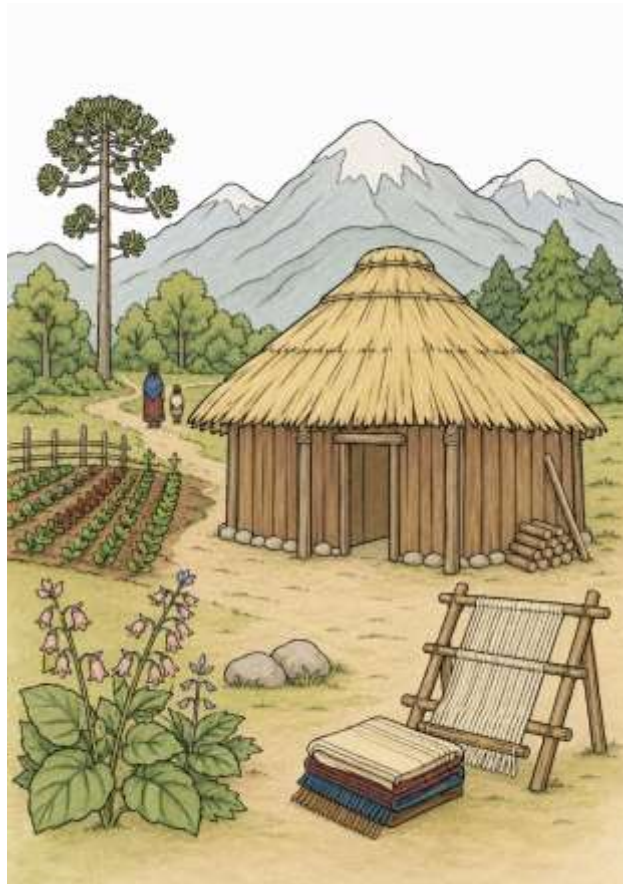

Welcome to **World Culture Coloring Pages Vol.5: Mapuche Edition**.

This printable activity book introduces five learning scenes inspired by Mapuche homes, weaving, cultivated land, forests, rivers, and everyday life in southern Chile and Argentina.

Each illustration is inspired by mountains, plants, houses, craft tools, textiles, cultivated fields, and daily life connected with the Mapuche-inspired themes featured in this volume.

These pages are designed as respectful starting points for learning. They are not intended to represent every Mapuche person or community, reproduce sacred or culturally restricted imagery, or provide a complete description of Mapuche culture.

Mapuche communities are diverse, living, and constantly changing. Mapuche people may live in rural areas, towns, or cities and may combine traditional knowledge with modern education, technology, work, art, media, and creative expression.

As you color each page, take time to read the short introduction and explore the related Linglobe article. Every language, landscape, and cultural tradition has a deeper story.

How to Use This Book

- Print the pages on A4 paper.
- Use colored pencils, crayons, pens, or markers.
- Read the short cultural introduction on each page.
- Visit Linglobe to learn more about the people and language.
- Use the activity at home, in a classroom, or as part of independent study.

A Note for Families and Educators

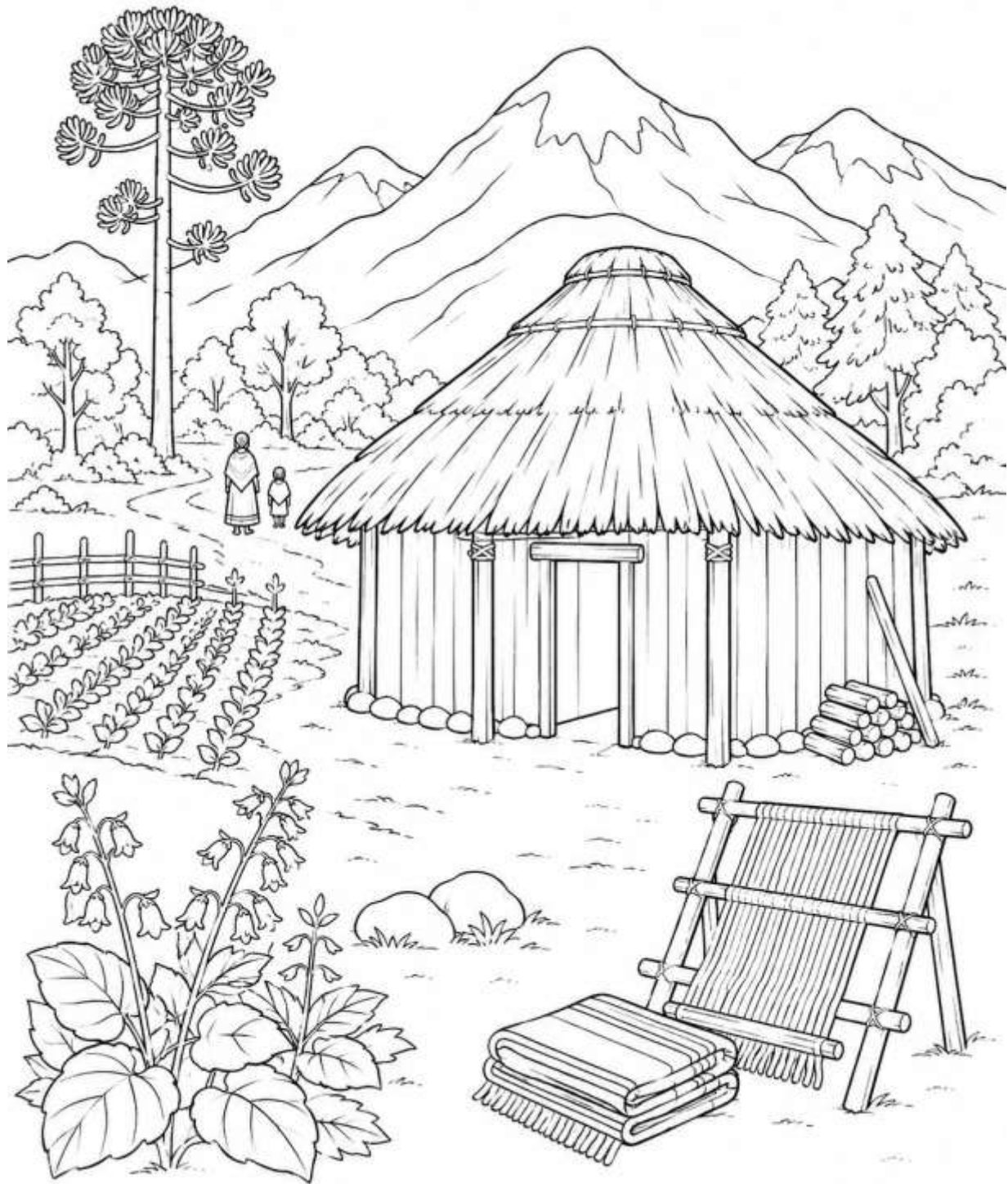
We encourage adults and learners to discuss the difference between cultural inspiration and complete cultural representation.

Mapuche-inspired Mountain and Community Scene



The Mapuche are an Indigenous people whose traditional territories extend across parts of present-day Chile and Argentina. Their culture is connected with land, mountains, forests, weaving, agriculture, and community life.

The Mapuche language is called **Mapudungun**. Many Mapuche communities have long maintained strong relationships with the natural environment, family life, practical knowledge, and handmade traditions.

This scene is inspired by everyday life in a Mapuche community, including homes, weaving, cultivated land, and the mountain landscape.

Look for:

a traditional-style house, a weaving frame, folded textiles, a small cultivated field, native plants, trees, mountains, and distant figures.

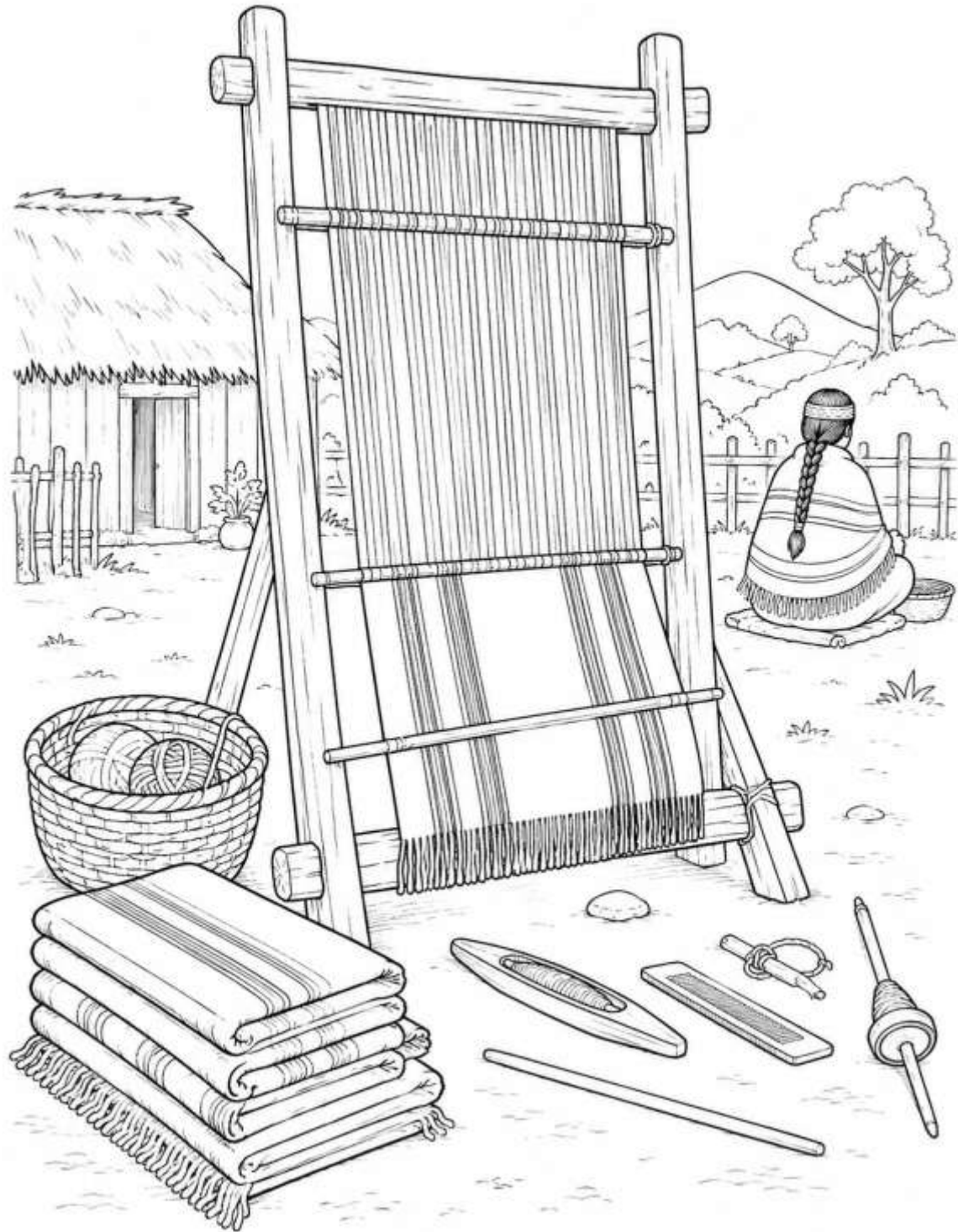
Think About It:

a weaving frame, folded textiles, a basket, craft tools, and a simple work area.

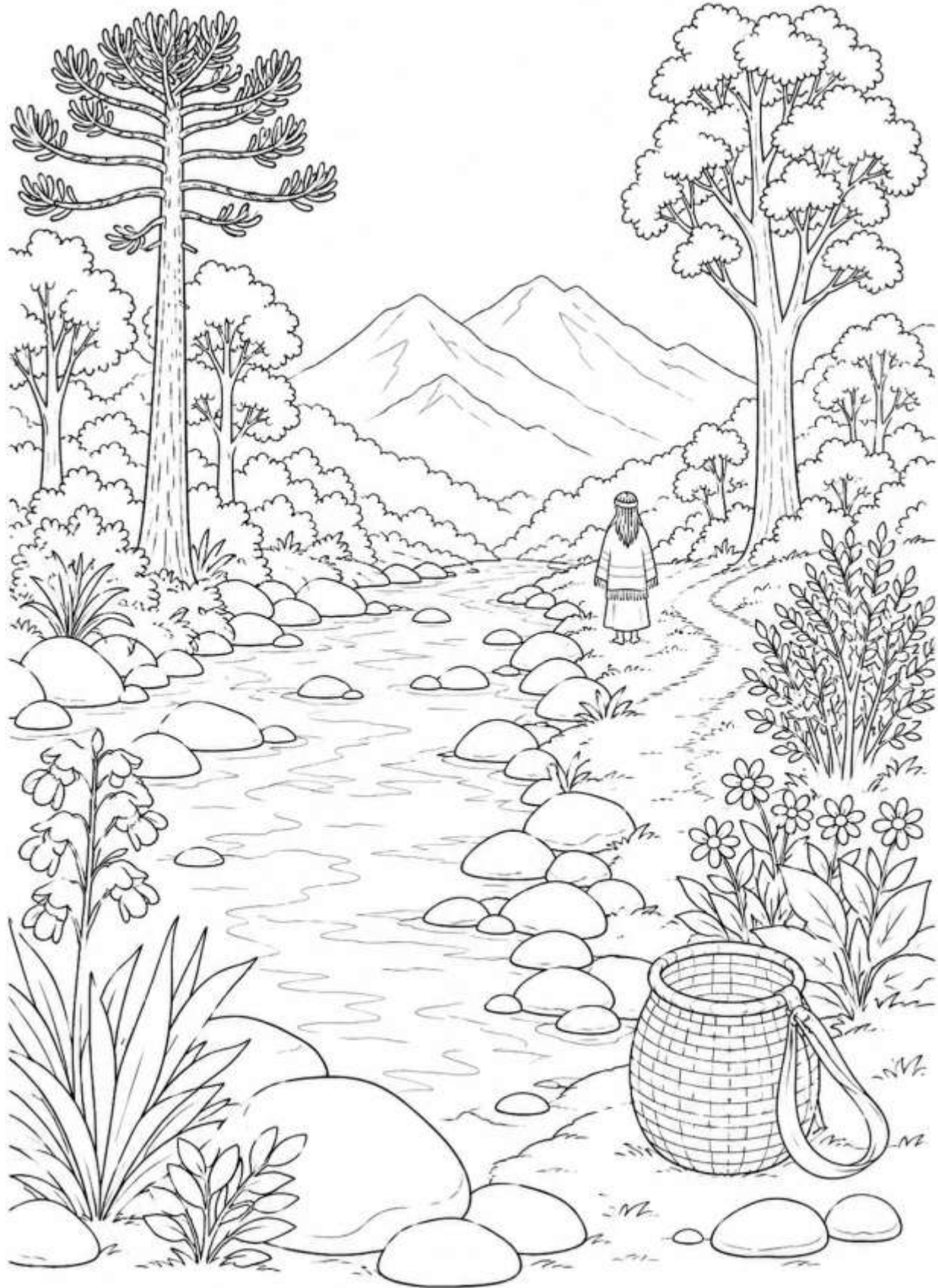
Think About It:

Forests and rivers are important parts of the southern landscapes where many Mapuche communities have lived. Natural environments can support food, materials, movement, and knowledge of place.

How can rivers and forests shape the way people understand and use the land around them?

How can animals become part of both daily life and cultural traditions?

Mapuche-inspired Garden and Cultivated Field Scene



Gardens and cultivated fields show how people work with land, seasons, and local plants. Everyday agriculture can be an important part of food, family life, and environmental knowledge.

rows of crops, a simple fence, a path, native plants, and a house or shelter nearby.

How can gardens and fields reflect the local environment and the needs of a community?
